Attic access often limits the size of items that can go up there but the attic conditions determine what is safe to store. Temperature - Some attic temperatures vary between below freezing to above 100 degrees F. Anything that is temperature sensitive-cold or hot-cannot be safely stored in an attic.

I'm currently "up north", and while I'm cleaning out my attic for my TV move, I'd just like to get some recommended rules of thumb from you for what CAN be stored in the attic. My attic never gets boiling hot in the summer, but that's not going to be the case in Florida. So I'm wondering about the location (if space is available) "closet", "garage" or "attic" for the following:

For context, attic has no AC, and I live in Tennessee, where it's just starting to cool down but it'll still be a bit humid for the time they'll be up there. Extra context, I won't have any boxed retail sets, everything is stored within ziploc bags, plastic containers or wrapped in bubble wrap (or some combo of the three).

Yes, clothes can be stored in a hot attic. The attic can get very hot at high temperatures. It may be bad for new clothes but storing old clothes won't be a bad idea as they need a lot of space in our wardrobe and almirahs. But, still is recommended to avoid storing clothes that are moisture friendly, burnable, bear emotional values, etc. ...

Such a simple question. Short answer: No. Long answer: No, it's way too hot. During 100+ degree weather, the temperature inside the attic can reach up to 20 degrees above the outdoor temps. Store card storage boxes in plastic storage boxes to protect them from rodents, bugs, and moisture. Put a dehumidifier in the attic. If you live in an area with extreme temperatures, you will also want to keep a portable air conditioner and portable ...

Due to space constraints and young kiddos, I must store my smallish collection of long guns and hand guns in the attic. Not ammunition. Michigan. The attic is partially finished with plywood over insulated studs and rafters. It is a gable roof with knee walls. There are open vents in each gable end wall (typical here in the Midwest).

Best Storage Containers For The Attic. You can use different containers to store your items in the attic. Hot attics are not conducive to a lot of things. However, you can still use the attic for storage by using suitable containers. Dust mites and moths will not penetrate: Plastic containers; Plastic bags; Glass containers; Ceramic jars

If you have valued wood furniture, it should never be stored in your attic. The temperature and humidity changes can damage finishes, glue, and wood itself depending on the attic's conditions. Valued wood furniture is best stored in a storage unit, or some place where temperature and humidity is regulated. 2. Photographs

Except especially large items, nothing should ever be stored loose in the attic. Skip cardboard boxes in favor of plastic lidded bins. For soft items, use large Ziploc Flexible Totes in place of trash bags that critters can easily get into. Avoid using bulky bubble wrap (and the potential of melting) by using plain newsprint instead.

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
